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Greetings from the Dean's Office!

Our academic year is well underway, and our M1s and M2s are settling into their routine of lectures, labs, and extracurricular activities. Our M3s have begun their clinical rotations, while our M4s submitted their residency applications in September and are immersed in the residency interview season!

To help the M1s successfully transition into their lives as medical students, I have been meeting with each of them one-on-one — a new initiative launched this year. These meetings give me an opportunity to learn about students' goals, aspirations, and struggles while sharing my perspective on what they can do to succeed in medical school. I've met with nearly half the M1 class so far, and I look forward to meeting with the rest of them in the coming months.

Among the crucial ingredients for our students' success are the outstanding contributions of our faculty, who excel in their teaching and mentorship. We recently had the chance to show our appreciation for our faculty during the annual CMS Faculty and Friends Recognition Dinner. Please join me in congratulating the faculty who were honored during the ceremony: Dr. Theodore Booden received the CMS Honor Medallion; Dr. Myrtis Sullivan received the Lattimer Award; Drs. Lisa Cheng, Sandra Ndiaye, and Suzanne Schulte received the Excellence in Clinical Education Award; Drs. Catherine Deamant and Joshua Polanski received the Excellence in Educational Innovation Award; Dr. Rahul Vijay received the Junior Faculty Investigator Award; Dr. Rilina Ghosh received the Outstanding Faculty Community Service Award; Dr. George Salti received the Clinical Preceptor Award; and Dr. Lalita Prasad-Reddy and Ms. Sarah Schuck received the Dean's Special Recognition Award. In addition to the individual awards, two of our clinical partners, Froedtert South and Northwestern Medicine McHenry and Huntley Hospitals, received the Affiliate Site Award.

In September, we welcomed many of our alumni back to campus for our CMS Reunion Weekend — including seven members of the Class of 1964, who were celebrating their 60th reunion! Our alumni had a wonderful time connecting with each other, current students, as well as faculty and administration. Congratulations to the three alumni who received awards for their illustrious careers: Dr. Sharon L. Hame (Class of '91) received the Distinguished Alumni Award for Achievement, Dr. Kaleem A. Malik (Class of '96) received the Distinguished Alumni Award for Service, and Dr. Basil K. Williams Jr. (Class of '11) received the Distinguished Alumni Award for Early Career Achievement.

We have another reason to celebrate our alumni: many of them have generously donated funds to create scholarships for our students. These endowments and other donations help make medical school accessible to

a more diverse student body, breaking down barriers on the path to becoming a physician. The Anne C. Kolker, MD 1980 Scholarship Fund has been created with a \$50,000 donation from Dr. Kolker. Dr. Manoj Monga (Class of '90) has set up an endowment fund for students interested in Urology to cover their expenses for sub-internship training so that they may be more competitive when they apply for residency in this specialty; the first gift of \$5,000 has already been received. Dr. Steven I. Ackerman (Class of '76) has donated \$51,000 to the CMS Emergency Student Related Expenses Fund. The Class of 1973 has raised \$35,000 towards an endowed fund to support student wellbeing, with donors including Drs. Joseph Sanfilippo, James Van Heest, Ian Love, Gerald Tarnoff, Melvin Roseman, Craig Joseph, David Lieb, and Alan Mensch. Dr. Joel Pengson (Class of '90), donated \$10,000 to be used for student scholarships, and Drs. Paul Granoff (Class of '64), Betty Kung Shen (Class of '94), and Allen Shen (Class of '94) were all inspired to donate funds for scholarships after attending the CMS Reunion in September. Dr. Albert Mak (Class of '89) has donated \$5,000 to the medical school, and Dr. Steven J. Bundra (Class of '82) donated \$7,500 for Greatest Strategic Priorities. Additionally, the Michael Reese Foundation has provided us with a grant for ~\$500,000 for four half-tuition scholarships to be distributed to incoming students to CMS who are underrepresented in medicine and have a financial need.

In recent months, the medical school has received a total of \$125,000 for preexisting scholarship funds: the Matthew N. Harris MD '56 Scholarship Fund has received \$100,000; the Frederick L. Perl, MD '51 Memorial Scholarship has received \$10,000; the Ronald E. Palmer, MD '75 and Kathleen Palmer Honorary Endowed Scholarship has received \$10,000; and the Dean Emeritus, Theodore Booden PhD Endowed Opportunity Scholarship has received \$5,000. Another fund is in the works: Dr. Rania Agha (Class of '02) is working with Institutional Advancement to set up a scholarship fund.

Dr. Mervyn Sahud (Class of '64) has donated \$2,500 towards the Annual Prosector Award for the M2 Advanced Regional Dissection Elective. Dr. Sahud established this award in 2023 to recognize and reward exemplary skills in cadaver dissection, advanced understanding of Clinical Anatomy, and teamwork, and he has funded the award each year since then.

As we look forward to the upcoming Thanksgiving holiday, I encourage you all to join me in taking a few

moments to reflect on the things in your life you are grateful for. These moments of gratitude and reflection can reduce stress and anxiety and improve our mental well-being. Personally, I would like to express my sincere gratitude for our entire CMS community, including our hard-working students and our dedicated faculty and staff. It takes a tremendous amount of dedicated effort to keep the medical school running smoothly, and I'm thankful for everyone's contributions to our purpose and our mission of educating the next generation of physicians and leaders.

As Winter Break approaches and the year draws to a close, I hope each of you are able to take some time to relax and spend time with family, friends, or other loved ones. As you reflect on everything you've accomplished this year and think about your goals for the coming year, I join you in anticipation of the adventures and opportunities that 2025 will bring. CMS Faculty and Friends Recognition Dinner


Chicago Medical School hosted its annual Faculty and Friends Recognition Dinner on October 30 at the Riverfront Restaurant in Northbrook, IL, to celebrate and express appreciation for the school's faculty and clinical partners. During the event, the school awarded special recognition to several individuals and groups who have put forth exemplary efforts to educate, mentor, and train our students.

Theodore Booden, PhD, CMS Dean Emeritus, received the **CMS Honor Medallion**, an award bestowed upon a faculty, staff member, student, or alumnus for novel and/or extraordinary accomplishments that have brought honor and prestige to the school through the delivery of novel healthcare methods, healthcare education, leadership, groundbreaking research, or exceptional acts of humanitarianism.

Myrtis Sullivan, MD, MPH, professor of pediatrics, received the **CMS Lattimer Award**, given to a senior faculty member who exhibits a long-standing record of outstanding performance in clinical teaching or research,

patient care, or public health. The award honors **Dr. Agnes Lattimer**, a distinguished pediatrician and one of the early Black women graduates of CMS, Class of 1954. Dr. Lattimer served as Medical Director of Cook County Hospital from 1986-1995, leading a fight against child lead poisoning in Chicago.

Lisa Cheng, MD, associate professor of pediatrics; **Sandra Ndiaye**, DO, co-education director of pediatrics; and **Suzanne Schulte**, MD, discipline chair and co-education director of pediatrics, received the **CMS Excellence in Clinical Education Award**, awarded to educators who demonstrate empathy and respect for students, create a culture that encourages student expression of ideas, act as an exemplary role model, and exhibit professional values and standards.

Catherine Deamant, MD, FAAHPM, FACP, professor of medicine and palliative care education faculty lead, and **Joshua Polanski**, PhD, assistant professor of cell biology and anatomy, received the **CMS Excellence in Educational Innovation Award**. This award is given





FACULTY SPOTLIGHT:

Dr. Ligaya Marasigan

Ligaya Marasigan, MD, FACOG, is an associate professor of obstetrics and gynecology who is actively involved in educating and supporting Chicago Medical School students in a variety of ways. In addition to her work as a faculty member teaching in the Endocrine-Reproductive block, she serves as a preceptor in the Essentials of Clinical Reasoning (ECR) course, a faculty mentor in the medical school's Individualized Strategic Enhancement Program (ISEP), and the chapter adviser of the CMS Philippine Medical Association (PMA).

Dr. Marasigan's role as a preceptor in the ECR course — an interprofessional, two-year course required for all medical and podiatry students — provides students with important specialized clinical knowledge. The course

serves as the entry point to students' clinical experience and includes a series of lectures, labs, workshops, and demos on topics such as vitals, cardiac/pulmonary exam, musculoskeletal exam, neurologic exam, acute mental exam, male/female GU and breast exam, ultrasounds, neurodiversity, and cultural awareness. Because the ECR course covers so much material, our 21 preceptors each bring their unique skillsets and specialties to the hands-on workshops. Dr. Marasigan brings her expertise as an obstetrician-gynecologist to give students the skills and knowledge needed to become physicians. She also serves as a preceptor for the weekly schema case discussions.

As an ISEP faculty mentor, Dr. Marasigan works with students to identify areas of personal strengths and

weaknesses that may affect each student's progress, and helps them develop an individualized plan for academic, personal, and professional success. ISEP is a voluntary support program for CMS students who are first-generation college students, economically and geographically disadvantaged, or facing any other environmental stressors that might impact their medical school experience. Faculty mentors hold one-on-one monthly meetings with students to help build strategies to achieve the student's goals.

As chapter advisor for the PMA, Dr. Marasigan supports CMS students in their mission to engage and empower the Filipino and Filipino-American local community in Lake County through social, medical, and cultural advocacy. In 2023, she helped plan a medical mission trip in the Philippines which gave CMS students the opportunity to learn about public health, work alongside local physicians, and understand how the Philippine health system works. PMA students got a chance to see community rural medicine in practice as they shadowed

Dr. Marasigan and local physicians at Dagupan Doctors Villaflor Memorial Hospital in the rural Pangasinan province. Dr. Marasigan also makes other contributions to the work of the PMA, helping students organize donation drives, coordinate guest physician speaker events, and plan the annual holiday Candlelight Concert.

In her clinical career, Dr. Marasigan has long been an advocate and champion for public health, spending the majority of her career as an obstetrician-gynecologist providing care to underserved communities at John H. Stroger Hospital of Cook County and at the Cook County Department of Corrections, where she advocates for the reproductive health of inmates.

Dr. Marasigan was nominated for this spotlight by fourth-year medical student **Med Jimenez**, MS, who said, "Dr. Marasigan's involvement with students and the community reflects her dedication to the spirit of 'Life in Discovery,' fostering growth and service." ■



WiSH Symposium

The university hosted its 9th Annual **Women in Science and Healthcare (WiSH) Symposium** on September 26, focusing on the theme “Gender Roles Under the Microscope.” The speakers and panelists examined the ways in which deeply ingrained gender roles and expectations can impact women’s experiences in the workplace, including impeding their advancement in the science and healthcare professions.

Amy Diehl, PhD, a gender equity researcher and chief information officer at Wilson College in Chambersburg, Pennsylvania, gave the keynote address on “Glass Walls: Shattering Gender Barriers in Science and Healthcare.” Dr. Diehl, who recently authored the book *Glass Walls: Shattering the Six Gender Bias Barriers Still Holding Women Back at Work*, discussed six core dimensions of workplace gender bias and then shared evidence-based strategies for shattering those barriers.

Dr. Diehl discussed the harm that results from these barriers — not only to individuals, but to organizations and to society as a whole — when women are prevented from reaching their full potential in the workplace. “It’s not just that one woman is pushed out of her role; it’s

harmful to our whole society when woman after woman after woman cannot fulfill her potential,” she said. “It’s really limiting society’s ability to solve our most pressing problems.”

This is especially tragic in the scientific and medical fields, Dr. Diehl noted, where the problems people are trying to solve affect lifespan and public health. “When we don’t have half of our society contributing to solving these problems, it really limits our ability to diagnose and cure disease,” she said.

After describing the framework of barriers affecting women in science and healthcare, Dr. Diehl turned her attention to solutions. She identified strategies to support women in the workplace, including actions that can be taken by leaders, allies, and individual women.

For the second half of the symposium, Dr. Diehl joined CMS alumna **Kimberley Darey**, MD '04, CPE, FACOG, RFU Board of Trustees vice chair and president of Elmhurst Hospital; Susanna Calkins, PhD, associate professor and director of RFU’s Nexus for Faculty Success; Danny Pancirer, CHP '26, physician assistant

student; and Allison Daminger, PhD, assistant professor of sociology, University of Wisconsin-Madison, for a panel discussion on “Redefining Gender Roles in Science and Healthcare.” The panelists shared their perceptions of how traditional gender roles translate to the workplace, shaping their experiences in the healthcare field.

Dr. Daminger, the assistant professor of sociology, approached the issue from a systematic perspective, noting that gender biases are deeply entrenched in our society and that implicit roles are learned early in life. “We’ve been raised this way. We’re steeped in a culture that has taught us a certain set of beliefs and characteristics,” she said. “It’s very helpful to think about the ways that we’re embedded in these systems.”

Because the barriers women face in the workplace are cultural and widespread, the panelists emphasized that it will take teamwork to tackle those issues and implement change. “It does take all of us working together,” said Dr. Diehl. “These gender biases are just so embedded into our culture — it’s going to take all of us.”

Dr. Darey agreed: “It takes allies. It takes people with influence to be able to help make change,” she said. “You need more allies to help change a system.”

The WiSH Symposium was launched in 2016 to celebrate the legacy of Dr. Rosalind Franklin, the university’s namesake, by highlighting the accomplishments of female scientists and clinicians and addressing the

hurdles that those women often face. Each year focuses on a different aspect of gender disparities in STEM fields, with past topics including gender bias, sexual harassment, intersectionality, the gendered impacts of climate change on health, and the importance of considering sex as a variable in medical research.

In her opening remarks at the start of this year’s symposium, **Wendy Rheault**, PT, PhD, FASAHP, FNAP, DipACLM, president and CEO of RFU, praised Dr. Rosalind Franklin for her perseverance in the face of gender discrimination. Dr. Franklin’s X-ray crystallography captured proof of the double-helical structure of DNA, launching an ongoing revolution in medical genetics.

“She disregarded gender roles and pushed past the sexism that she experienced. Her resilience led to a breakthrough in our understanding of genetics, and is regarded as probably one of the most meaningful discoveries of the twentieth century,” Dr. Rheault said. “We are honored to carry on her name and her legacy.” ■

Farewell to Dr. Ronald Kaplan

This fall, we said farewell to **Ronald Kaplan**, PhD, who retired on September 30 after 27 years of service to the university. Dr. Kaplan served as the university's executive vice president for research and Chicago Medical School's vice dean for research, as well as holding a faculty appointment as professor of biochemistry and molecular biology. He also served as interim dean of the medical school from 2019 to 2020. His leadership and expertise were invaluable as we navigated an accreditation visit in the spring of 2020 while also adapting to the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic.

An investigator in the Center for Proteomics and Molecular Therapeutics, Dr. Kaplan is an international expert in the field of mitochondrial transporters. His research has focused on the structure, function, and regulation of mitochondrial and plasma membrane citrate transport proteins at the molecular level.

In 2018, he successfully reorganized the basic sciences departments at CMS. The change realigned our research strengths around core areas of scientific expertise with the goal of fostering innovation. This was a critical step in the founding of the university's Innovation and Research Park and Helix 51 incubator, which Dr. Kaplan championed.

In a ceremony on September 26, faculty, staff, and academic partners gathered to celebrate Dr. Kaplan's service to the university and wish him a happy retirement. We take this opportunity to thank him again for his many contributions to the medical school and for his dedication to our missions of education and research. ■



Music as Medicine

Héctor Rasgado-Flores, PhD, professor of physiology and biophysics, was invited to give a talk titled “Music as Medicine” at the “Ciencia que Palpita” (Science that Beats) Symposium at the Benemérita Universidad Autónoma de Puebla, held October 14–15 in Puebla, Mexico. The symposium gathered academic health professionals together to discuss how the environment can affect cardiorespiratory and neurological health.

It is well known that music is a potent mood modifier that could have significant therapeutic effects, but scientists do not fully understand how music works on the human body. Dr. Rasgado’s presentation described current knowledge and new hypotheses explaining music’s therapeutic effects.

As part of his presentation, Dr. Rasgado performed a concert of his piano composition “Body Notes: A Musical Interpretation of the Life Cycle from a Physiological Perspective.” The composition, which was commissioned by the American Physiological Society, is a symphonic suite in 13 movements that uses music to describe various aspects of human physiology including the heartbeat, the elegant control of skeletal muscles, the release of hormones, and apoptosis (cell death). ■

CMS Student Research Fair







IN MEMORIAM

David Garfield, MD

*Former Psychiatry Residency Program Director,
Education Director, and Professor*



Dr. David Garfield died peacefully at his home on October 4, 2024 after a long illness. Dr. Garfield is remembered fondly by many in the Chicago Medical School community for his passion for psychiatry, and for the compassion, mentorship, friendship, and kindness he showed to his students and trainees during his 30 years at CMS.

Dr. David Garfield received his medical degree from UCSF School of Medicine and completed his psychiatry residency at Harvard's Massachusetts Mental Health Center. He later trained in psychoanalysis and continued on the faculty of the Chicago Institute for Psychoanalysis. He was a Lifetime Distinguished Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association and a member of Alpha Omega Alpha. During his career, he wrote dozens of articles on psychotherapy, lectured internationally on psychosis, and authored the textbook *Unbearable Affect: A Guide to the Psychotherapy of Psychosis*, which focused on the role of emotion in the process of psychotherapy with psychotic patients.

He joined CMS in 1987 as director of the psychiatry residency program, serving twice in that role during his tenure as a CMS faculty member. He also served as education director of psychiatry, and was named professor emeritus following his retirement in 2019. Dr. Garfield has touched generations of students and young physicians with his teaching and mentorship, having trained hundreds of residents and medical students.

He was an outstanding psychiatrist and educator whose passion for the field of psychiatry and commitment to mental health were evident in his patient care and teaching.

Dr. Garfield is survived by his wife Bonnie, daughter Jenny, son Jacob, and three grandchildren. He will be greatly missed by all who knew him, and he will be remembered with fondness and gratitude by the many students, faculty, residents, and graduates whose lives he touched during his time at Chicago Medical School. ■



Distinguished Alumnus Awards

Each year during our Reunion Weekend, we celebrate the remarkable achievements of our Chicago Medical School alumni who have made significant contributions to the field of medicine. We take great pride in recognizing the following alumni for their impact on our university, our community, and the world.

Sharon L. Hame, MD '91

Sharon L. Hame, MD '91, received the **2024 Distinguished Alumni Award for Achievement**, which recognizes significant impact in the field of medicine and efforts that have brought distinction to Chicago Medical School.

Dr. Hame is a board certified orthopaedic surgeon with subspecialty certification in sports medicine. She has been practicing orthopaedic sports medicine for over 24 years. She is currently a professor of clinical orthopaedic surgery and sees patients at the UCLA Medical Center and the West Los Angeles VA Medical Center.

Dr. Hame completed her orthopaedic surgery residency at the New York University Medical Center and her sports medicine fellowship at the University of California, Los

Angeles. Dr. Hame treats a wide variety of sports medicine injuries including knee ligament injuries, meniscus tears, hip labral tears, femoral acetabular impingement, rotator cuff tears, and shoulder instability. She has expertise in knee, hip, and shoulder arthroscopy. Dr. Hame is past president of the Ruth Jackson Orthopaedic Society and of the FORUM Society. She is the Vice Chair of Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI) and Chair of the UCLA Department of Orthopaedic Surgery EDI Committee. As a sports medicine orthopaedic surgeon, Dr. Hame also serves as the Associate Team physician for the UCLA Athletic Department. She is the team physician for UCLA Football, UCLA Women's Basketball, UCLA Women's Indoor and Beach Volleyball, and UCLA Men's Tennis. She is also in her third season as Head Team Physician for the Los Angeles Sparks and a team physician for USA Basketball. She most recently traveled with USA Basketball to the Olympic Games in Paris.

As a researcher, Dr. Hame has focused her research on knee ligament biomechanics, revision ACL reconstruction, early sports specialization, and injury risk assessment and injury prevention in athletes. She collaborates with

the UCLA Athletic Department, the UCLA Department of Radiology, as well as researchers from across the country. Dr. Hame has over 80 peer-reviewed publications and speaks nationally and internationally at orthopaedic and sports medicine meetings.
