




The University itself is comprised of five different colleges that make up a single institution. All of the programs at RFU are graduate level and they are all focused on clinical/medical sciences.







Again there is a separate vision for Rosalind Franklin University. Note the emphasis on the values of diversity and teamwork.





Clinical Anatomy: Shared with the Chicago Medical School




Medicine: Sections of the course are shared with the Doctor of Nursing Practice program



Capstones – Overall preparation for Clerkships and enhancement of clinical knowledge. They make up the first half of the third year curriculum.



- Y1 Observation and vitals, 3 afternoons for a total of 12 hours.
- Y2 Work with P3s and clinical faculty from August to December and then with clinical faculty alone from January to May




Jesse Brown is VA hospital in Chicago, in the Illinois Medical Corridor and down the street from Stroger Hospital. Patients are often very sick.

Stroger is a level one trauma center, students do podiatry rotation, will likely do a general surgery rotation and may do emergency medicine.

Scholl Foot and Ankle Libertyville – in the medical building at Advocate-Condell Hospital, general podiatry.

Edward Hines is a VA hospital in the western suburbs of Chicago and is associated with Loyola Medical Center.




Erie Clinics – there are two in the city of Chicago and one in Waukegan. Patient population is pediatrics to seniors.


Northpointe Resources is in Zion, IL and patients are developmentally handicapped adults.

Pacific Garden Mission is the largest homeless shelter in Chicago.

Park Place Senior Center is in Waukegan, services provided to patients are basic podiatry.




This is the total amount of encounters for the class of 2018 as a whole (not per person), there are 76 graduates in this class.



While there are many opportunities for simulation education on our campus in North Chicago, we also have simulation experiences at this site in Huntley. We own the fourth floor, half of the third, and a simulated ambulance bay at this hospital. While we would love to show you the site, it is located approximately an hour away from campus.




The site is also home to some classroom space.



This is a simulated out-patient room that students will have exposure to standardized patient encounters.




The Huntley location also has in-patient rooms with SIM dummies in them. The whole area, including the rooms themselves, are set up and stocked as though they are a real hospital.




These patient rooms help prepare students for their clinical experiences and clerkships. This room contains a SIM dummy that is pregnant.




Surgical simulations at the Huntley location are based on working with SIM dummies. This picture has more people in it than you would normally have in an operating room, however the way the students have gowned and gloved is accurate (as is the way they hold their hands).



SCPM offers more clerkship rotations than any other DPM program and does so earlier than other programs.




Non – podiatric Clerkships: Medicine, Emergency Medicine and General Surgery.





Recently, residency positions available have approximately equaled the number of graduates from U.S. podiatric medical colleges. This does not mean that a residency program is guaranteed for every podiatric medical college graduate. Although residency programs may have positions available, those positions are not required to be filled if a program feels that no desirable candidates are available to fill the position, or for any other reason, the program feels that it is in its best interest not to fill the position. In addition, previous graduates may be seeking residency positions, competing with current graduates. With the rapidly changing health care environment, from year to year a significant number of residency positions may be gained or lost, and from year to year, the number of matriculants at podiatric medical schools changes, also significantly affecting the graduate to residency position balance. As a result, a residency program for every podiatric medical school graduate cannot be guaranteed.

Applications may be submitted for the DPM-MSc Program in the first year and for the DPM-PhD program in the second year. Students applying to the DPM-PhD program must participate in the Summer Research Program. PhD program starts after the second year of the DPM program and takes between three and five years to complete. 
